# MINISTRY STORY

In one of our classes about teaching a discussion-style Bible study, Om was sharing from Matthew 6:25-34. This style of teaching is a challenge for these students because they're not used to thinking in terms of this type of Bible study. For the most part, Bible study means that the leader studies, and the congregation listens as the leader shares what they have learned. This "new" method excites the students.

As Om brought the study to a close, she asked, "What kinds of things are you worried about?" A simple question. We each gave a response of some kind to keep the conversation going. There are always the obvious for the students: how are we going to pay for tuition next year? Are we going to get COVID when we go back to our family? How will we travel to and from the village? But then I turned the question on the "teacher." What are you worried about in these days? Her answer surprised me and gave me pause.

"I'm afraid of being shot."

You see, her village is close to the border

of another country where the military is seemingly not constrained by law, morality, or any other ethical considerations. And people on this side of the border have been targets. They have been targets simply because they are a part of a people group that the military has deemed available for extermination. Kind of put some things into perspective for me. Some worries carry a heavy burden.
